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The Glory of Mary

Often, we see headlines with flashy words like number one or spotlight. We invest ourselves in stalking social media, tracking charts, and watching others revel in the spotlights they created. We become possessed by the idea of being first, longing for our name at the top of the list. Life becomes a competition, and we become addicted to our search for "glory." But, we aren't searching for the right kind of glory - glory with God and our fellow Catholics - we want fame for ourselves.

Mary never got caught in the continuous search for fame; she strived to bring others to glory - the glory of God. Through her, Jesus was born; she brought our Savior into the world, yet she never tried to steal the spotlight. She prompted Him to perform his first public miracle at the wedding of Cana, helping the hosts, but she didn't claim any credit. She raised Him, supported Him, taught Him, and loved Him, but she never tried to overshadow Him. When her Son rose to glory, she didn't force herself into the frame; she allowed Him to shine, projecting the light of God, knowing that she had helped bring Christ into so many people's lives. Why can't we imitate Mary and bring Christ to others?

There are countless ways to imitate Mary and bring Christ to others, starting by acting out of love for others instead of benefit for ourselves. Take Jesus's birth for example. Mary created the most amazing gift for us, Christ our Savior, but she didn't do it for a thank you. She did it out of love for us and God, so that we could one day spread the gift. It may seem hard to detach ourselves from the natural desire for recognition, but the reward for doing so - harmony in Heaven - is so glorious that we can endure that difficult transition. We can imitate Mary by selflessly giving others gifts of love, hope, and Jesus. If we do everything out of love for others and God, we won't have to worry about being number one, because we will know that the greatest reward is eternal life in Heaven.
